How to play and learn with First Lacing Pictures

Every child is unique and will develop skills at different rates. With your help and encouragement, your child can practise their skills and learn new ones. Some children will need support while others will enjoy playing independently. Here are some ideas for learning through play using First Lacing Pictures.

- Spread out the animal pictures and encourage your child to name each animal and then choose one to start lacing.
- Ask your child to choose a coloured lace. This is a good opportunity for your child to practise naming the colours of each lace.

- 3. Encourage your child to hold one end of the lace and thread it through a hole of their choice. They can then pull the lace through leaving a little tail behind or tie a knot in one end of the lace for your child. Remind them to continue pulling the lace through after each new hole.
- 4. Once your child has learnt how to thread the lace through the holes, they can go on to create their own pattern. At first your child may lace the picture in a random pattern, they may move on to stitching around the edge of the card or following the outline of the animal. It is important that your child explores their own ideas and enjoys developing their lacing skills.
- Discuss with your child the pattern they have created and other possible ways of making new patterns. Praise them for their achievement.
